

URB 301: Cities in Time & Space

This is an exciting new course in the field of urban studies. Its purpose is to give you a global perspective on cities in widely different historical and geographical contexts. It consists of a series of modules that focus on a city or group of cities at different historical times and in different parts of the world. Examples include: ancient Greek cities, Mayan cities, early European trading entrepots, African post-colonial cities, a history of Havana, port cities in the modern world economy, the present-day 'Latino' metropolis in the United States, and more. At a conceptual level, we engage questions about urbanization processes; the cultural, political, and economic foundation and meaning of cities; urban form; the place of cities in the world economy; and notions of comparative urbanism. The course is taught by a team of professors from across the University.
